A MESSAGE FROM THE APSS BARGAINING TEAM

Thank you for all who were able to attend the APSS Fall Luncheon – it was great to reconnect with many of you and re-introduce you to the APSS Bargaining Team and the work that we do on your behalf. For those who were not able to attend, I provided introductions of our team members, a brief outline of the importance of the representative work that we do, and a timeline on what our work will look like as we approach bargaining in 2025.

We did have a recent change to our committee membership. Avis Merry, who was appointed to the APSS Bargaining Team last spring has accepted an AP position outside of our bargaining unit. Fortunately, Nicole Brower had expressed interest in serving in this capacity last spring and was interviewed. While all 3 candidates were recommended to the Executive Board for appointment to the negotiations committee, we only had 2 vacancies to fill at that time. I asked Nicole if she was still willing to serve in this capacity, she said yes, and the Executive Board of the APSS voted in unanimous agreement for this appointment. This is your APSS Bargaining Team: Michelle Holstege, Rhonda LeMieux, Rory Webb, Nicole Brower, Tami John, ex-officio/President, Cheryl Fischer, ex-officio/Historical Perspective, Shawn Evans, Chairperson

Additionally, our longstanding relationship with legal counsel, John Karafa, has concluded on great terms. John's work/firm has moved away from employment law, and he asked to step aside in order to attend to growing areas of his portfolio. Fortunately, John – always looking out for us – didn't want to end this professional relationship without providing a recommendation to another excellent legal resource who can assist us with our work. Many of you do not know John and the often invisible representation, guidance, and support he has provided for the last ten years – since the Alliance of Professional Support Staff formed as an independent, unaffiliated union. While we are sad to lose John in this capacity, we are excited to work with Michelle McLean and Katie Steffes, from Bolhouse Law in Grandville, as legal counsel for the APSS.

Our current contract expires on September 30, 2025 and we will be bargaining a new contractual agreement between the APSS and GVSU next year. The work we do through negotiations should be a direct reflection of your will and vour voice as APSS members. We will survey the membership - likely in between Thanksgiving and Winter breaks - to solicit your concerns, ideas, and feedback. The team will then review the survey results, examine the language of the current contract closely, and keep a keen eye on contractual language that still needs further refinement or clarification. The APSS Bargaining Team will begin meeting in earnest weekly (or more, as needed) in January to examine these (and more) data points in an effort to inform areas of interest for negotiation. Interest based bargaining (IBB) is less formal and restrictive than traditional bargaining environments. In my experience, the end result is a tentative agreement that is much more informed by the interests that you identify in the bargaining survey and the concerns that have come to fruition during the life of the current contract. We usually begin negotiations with the employer in late May/early June. We are exploring an IBB training/refresher course for all team members - we usually include both our team and the employer's team. During negotiations, we will attend to the identified interests related to contractual language clauses (and grammar/punctuation). Once we have completed negotiations on contractual language, we will attend to identified interests related to financial implications. The end result of our work is a tentative agreement that we will present to the APSS membership for ratification, early in the fall 2025 semester. APSS membership decides whether we have worked to arrive at a tentative agreement that sufficiently speaks to your will and your voice and, if we do not, you have the power to send us back to the negotiations table. Once APSS membership has ratified the tentative agreement, the GVSU Board of Trustees will also need to ratify the tentative agreement. Once both parties have ratified, a final document is signed and uploaded to the Human Resources website. Our goal is to have this work completed prior to September 30, 2025.

Please take your time to provide a thoughtful response to the APSS bargaining survey when it arrives. In the meantime, please do not hesitate to connect with me if you have any questions or concerns related to contractual language, contractual clauses, or the work of bargaining.

SAFETY TIPS: CARE REPORTS

BY GVPD

CARE referrals are intended to encourage faculty, staff, students and others to voluntarily refer a student who may be struggling with academic, personal or emotional difficulties and may be exhibiting concerning behavior.

CARE referrals can be submitted for health and safety concerns, family issues, financial or food insecurity, and other situations that challenge an individual's well-being. Students, faculty and staff can submit a CARE referral on the GVSU website.

The CARE team's primary function is to help keep the university community safe and connect distressed students to support services. The team seeks prevention rather than reaction to students in distress.

In doing this the CARE team:

- Gathers and manages reported information from concerned faculty, staff and peers
- Reaches out to students who have been referred to connect them to support services
- Provides faculty and staff with support and intervention resources

Depending on the circumstances, the Dean of Students Office may reach out to the student being referred. Staff will assist in connecting students with relevant resources across campus and provide outreach and follow-up as needed and when appropriate to promote student success.

There may be circumstances where students are not contacted by a member of the CARE team, but appropriate staff members are always made aware of the concerns. Someone from the CARE team will follow up with the reporting party only when additional information is needed.

If a concern involves an immediate safety risk to oneself or others, call 911.



HOW DO I VOTE?

For Michigan residents, visit michigan.gov/GVSUVotes to find your voter registration status, register to vote, and find your polling place. If you are an out-of-state resident, visit vote.org for more information.

WHERE DO I VOTE?

If you are a resident of Allendale (including off campus), the Kirkhof Center serves as a satellite Clerk's Office for the Presidential election. They have office hours on Friday, November 1 from 10:00 AM to 3:00 PM. If you live in another township/city in Michigan, or it is after November 1, please visit www.mi.gov/vote to find your polling place and go VOTE!

VOTER VANS

On Tuesday, November 5, 2024, voter vans will leave and return to the GVSU Kirkhof parking lot approximately every 30 minutes from 8 am to 8 pm to take voters to and from the following polling locations:

- Allendale Township Clerk for those who live in Allendale and need to register and vote using their Allendale address on Election Day.
- Life Stream Church, Allendale polling location – for those already registered in Allendale who want to vote.
- Georgetown Township Clerk for those who live in Georgetown and need to register and vote using their Georgetown address on Election Day.
- Wellspring Church, Georgetown Township polling location for those already registered in Georgetown who want to vote.

Are you interested in driving a voter van to and from the locations? Sign up <u>HERE</u>! (Must be 18 with a valid Michigan driver's license)

CHECKLIST FOR VOTING WEEK

1. Check your voter registration status

Make sure you are registered to vote at your current address. Check your registration status at <u>Michigan.gov/Vote</u>.

2. Look-up your polling place

Each voter has an assigned polling place they must visit to cast a ballot on Election Day. Find your designated polling place at <u>Michigan.gov/Vote</u>.

***If you are in line when polls close at 8pm, STAY IN LINE! You will be permitted to cast a ballot.

3. Cast your ballot

Visit your polling place or return your absentee ballot. If voting by absentee or mailed ballot, your ballot must be returned to your clerk's office, or to one of your clerk's ballot drop boxes by 8 p.m. on Election Day for it to be counted.

VOTING RELEASE TIME GUIDANCE FOR 2024 PRESIDENTIAL ELECTION

Voting

A department should provide an employee with sufficient time, generally up to two (2) hours of paid time off, for voting. Employees must work with their supervisors to ensure sufficient notice of absence and to maintain department operations. The two (2) hours is considered paid time off, but will not be deducted from the employee's annual time balance. This will only be available to staff that are scheduled to work on election day between the hours of 7 a.m. and 7 p.m.

Volunteering at Polls

Any full-time employee that works at a polling station will be granted a full paid day off based on scheduled hours. Employees must work with their supervisors to ensure sufficient notice of absence and to maintain departmental operations. An employee who earns income from working at a polling station will receive the difference between this income and regular pay.

Time Tracking

Hourly employees reporting time off to vote or volunteer should "Request Absence" in Workday and select either "Voting Release" or "Voting Poll Worker" for the time off code. This does not impact any current PTO banks.



Our colleague, Kathy Rice, retired October 4 from University Development after 20 years of service to the university. We'd like to thank her for her service!






MOM'S MEATLOAF BY SUSAN WEISE

"This is my mom's meatloaf recipe, and I've loved it since I was a kid. It's the only thing I can make of hers that ends up tasting as good as she makes it!"

- 1 pound ground beef or venison
- 1 pound pork sausage (seasoned breakfast sausage like Jimmy Dean, etc.)
- 1 egg
- 1 bread loaf heel (white or wheat bread)
- ½ to ½ cup of milk (enough to soak bread heel)
- 1 onion, chopped

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Rip up bread heel into small pieces, add milk and let sit to soften bread. Mix all other ingredients thoroughly (easiest to do by hand with food gloves on) and then add bread and milk mixture and mix thoroughly. Form into a loaf, place in 9x13 glass baking dish, uncovered. Bake for 1 hour. Check with food thermometer and make sure middle reaches 160 degrees (whether beef or venison) before removing from oven. Enjoy!





CROCKPOT HOT APPLE CIDER BY THE SPRUCE EATS

- 12 cups apple cider
- 1/3 cup brown sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cloves
- 1/4 teaspoon ground allspice
- 3 (3-inch) sticks cinnamon
- 1 small orange
- 5 whole cloves
- Star anise, for garnish (optional)

Combine the apple cider, brown sugar, ground allspice, cinnamon sticks, and the orange studded with 5 whole cloves in a 4 to 5 quart slow cooker. Cover the crockpot and cook on low for 2 to 3 hours, stirring occasionally. Serve in mugs, garnished with star anise, if used, and enjoy!

*You can also transfer to a percolator to keep hot/serve.




