Submit Your Interest by January 31

The next cohort of Leading Lakers: Activate will take place on Wednesday February 26, 2025 and March 5, 2025, on the Health Campus in DCIH, room 104. Pods will meet once a month from March-August 2025 based on their own availability. Participation in both days of programming, as well as the monthly accountability pods, is required for completion of the Activate program.

All regular, full-time employees (AP, PSS, Faculty, MGS, POAM, COAM, Security Staff) are eligible and encouraged to submit an interest form. The Activate program is open to any employee who has an interest in growing as a leader regardless of supervisory status.

Starting in 2025, Activate cohorts will be offered twice a year, and this cohort will be eligible to participate in the upcoming cohort of Leading Lakers: Accelerate, tier two in the program. ### CAMPUS SAFETY TIPS: GVPD SERVICES BY GVPD

In addition to responding to emergency calls and patrolling roadways, GVPD is proud to provide safety-and-security-related services to members of the community.



Registering a bicycle with GVPD gives the department a better chance to recover and return the bike in the event it is stolen or lost. #### **Fingerprinting**

GVPD provides fingerprinting services at the Pew Grand Rapids Campus location. Fingerprinting services are provided to current GVSU students, faculty and staff for state or federal background checks for a fee. Fingerprinting is available <a href="mailto:by-appointment only">by-appointment only</a>, and appointments must be made at least one day in advance.

#### **Lost & Found**

GVPD responds to reports of lost and found items valued at or above \$100. Lost items can be reported lost with GVPD regardless of the item's value. GVPD will hold items of value for six months before donating them to the GVSU Surplus Store or destroying them. Items of minor value will be held at the campus locations where they are found. Pick-up locations and other information can be found on GVPD's lost and found page.



#### **Prescription Drop-Off Box**

GVPD has prescription drop-off boxes at both its Allendale Campus and Pew Grand Rapids Campus locations. The drop boxes can be used to dispose of all medications, including controlled medicines. It is important to remove or black out any personal information on the medicine containers before dropping them off at the department. More information can be found on the GVPD website.

#### Ride-Along Program

GVPD's ride-along program is available to civilians to accompany a police officer while on duty. The program is currently available to registered GVSU students with an interest in criminal justice, an interest in a career in law enforcement or at the discretion of the Chief of Police. #### **Awareness Programs**



GVPD provides programming to address a wide variety of age groups and life situations. The department provides specialized information depending on audience needs if given advance notice. Program requests should be made at least two weeks in advance.

### WINDOWS 11 UPGRADES BEGIN JANUARY 2025 BY IT OPERATIONS

In January 2025, GVSU Information Technology (IT) will begin migrating university-managed computers to Microsoft Windows 11, with the transition scheduled to conclude by August 2025. This upgrade is essential to maintain secure and reliable systems as Microsoft ends support for Windows 10 on October 14, 2025.

The migration will occur in phases, with faculty and staff able to choose a convenient time for their upgrade or follow their assigned schedule. To help you prepare, the <u>Windows 11 Roadmap</u> for <u>GVSU</u> outlines what to expect, the phased timeline, and key features of the new system.



## PROTECTING PII: WHY YOU SHOULD NEVER SEND SENSITIVE INFORMATION VIA EMAIL BY IT OPERATIONS

At Grand Valley State University, safeguarding Personally Identifiable Information (PII) is a critical component of maintaining the trust and safety of our campus community. Among the most sensitive pieces of PII are Social Security Numbers (SSNs), which, if compromised, can lead to identity theft and other forms of fraud. Yet, email—a convenient communication tool—remains a common weak link in protecting such information.

Here's why sending PII, especially SSNs, via email is risky and how you can prevent a security breach.

#### Why Email Isn't Secure for PII:

- 1. Lack of Encryption: Email systems, by default, are insecure. This makes intercepted emails readable to bad actors during transmission.
- 2. Phishing Threats: Cybercriminals often impersonate trusted individuals, tricking recipients into sharing sensitive data via email. Responding to such requests can unintentionally expose confidential information.
- 3. Email Attachments Aren't Safe: Attachments containing SSNs or other PII are easily overlooked in terms of security. If sent to the wrong recipient or intercepted, they can be compromised.
- 4. Human Error: A simple typo in an email address could send sensitive data to the wrong person. Retrieving or undoing such a mistake is not possible.

#### **Best Practices for Handling PII:**

- Never Email PII, Including SSNs Avoid including PII in the body of an email or as an attachment. This applies whether you're sending or responding to a message.
- Use Secure File Sharing Platforms: GVSU
  offers secure platforms such as Zoom, Microsoft
  Teams, and Microsoft OneDrive for sharing
  sensitive information. These systems use
  advanced encryption and access controls,
  ensuring that data is transmitted and stored
  safely.
- Verify Requests for PII: If you receive a request for PII, even from a familiar name, verify its authenticity by contacting the sender through a known, separate channel.
- Mask SSNs When Possible: If you must handle SSNs, only include the last four digits and use secure methods for transmitting or storing this information.
- Shred Physical Copies and Delete Digital Records: Don't keep records of PII longer than necessary. Shred physical copies securely and ensure digital files are deleted from all devices, including email accounts.




