A MESSAGE FROM THE APSS BARGAINING TEAM BY SHAWN EVANS. BARGAINING COMMITTEE CHAIR



A few APSS members have asked how the potential dissolution of the Department of Education (DOE) could impact our contractual negotiations, potential wage scale increases, etc.

While DOE is presently responsible for federal financial aid and Title IX (and other Title) compliance, GVSU does not rely on DOE funding – almost all of GVSU's budget is funded by tuition dollars and state appropriations. Should the DOE be dissolved – which would require an act of Congress – what the DOE does would likely become the responsibility of other federal agencies and/or the states. MICHIGAN EARNED SICK TIME ACT BY TAMI JOHN, PRESIDENT

A few members have asked about the Michigan Earned Sick Time Law that just went into effect on Friday, February 21, 2025. Please note things will be unchanged for union employees until their current collective bargaining agreement expires. Human Resources is still finalizing policy and training for all non-union employees.

You will see ESTA (Hourly) listed on your Time Off Balance in Workday. Again, this will not need to be utilized for bargaining unit positions. Our salary continuation remains the same.

Language

ESTA states that "If an employer's employees are covered by a collective bargaining agreement in effect on the effective date of this act and the collective bargaining agreement conflicts with this act, this act applies beginning on the stated expiration date in the collective bargaining agreement. The collective bargaining agreement includes terms regarding sick time or sick leave benefits: Provided that the collective bargaining agreement includes terms related to sick leave, sick time, PTO with uses for sick time, or a similar benefit, the collective bargaining agreement terms apply, even if the benefit is less than what is 8 required by the ESTA, until the agreement expires or is renewed, extended, or otherwise renegotiated. The agreement also applies in situations where the agreement expressly excludes sick leave benefits. The collective bargaining agreement is silent as it relates to sick time or sick leave benefits: Employees covered by a collective bargaining agreement that is completely silent on sick leave, either for the entire unit or for specific classifications covered by the agreement, are covered by the ESTA and begin accruing benefits on February 21, 2025, unless they are a small employer as outlined above

HONORING RAMADAN AT GVSU

Ramadan, the holiest month in the Islamic calendar, is a time of fasting, reflection, prayer, and community. During Ramadan, most Muslims fast from pre-dawn to sunset, abstaining from both food and water. This fast is broken each evening with a meal called iftar (fast breaking meal).

The <u>Kaufman Interfaith Institute</u> and the Muslim Students Association (MSA) are committed to providing support and resources for our community members during this important time.

Support & Resources

- MSA Iftars: The Muslim Students Association is hosting a series of iftars or fast-breaking meals that are open to the entire GVSU community, taking place on March 11, March 18, and March 25 at 7:30 p.m. in Kirkhof 2263. RSVP on LakerLink if you plan to attend.
- Interfaith Reflection Rooms: There are <u>Interfaith Reflection Rooms</u> located on the Allendale Campus, Pew Campus, and Health Campus, each equipped with a prayer rug for your use.
- Laker Food Co. Offerings: During Ramadan, Laker Food Co. is offering vegetarian protein packs at the Lobby Shop, Kleiner POD and Connection POD, vegan and vegetarian options around campus, and more dietary options. The Connection and The Dish (along with their POD stores) are open until midnight for students to grab food after breaking their fast. Additionally, to-go meal options will be available to eat when you're ready. Review all Ramadan dining options.

Here are a few ways you can engage with and support students and colleagues in our community who may be fasting:

- Be mindful of fasting and prayer times: If you have a class or meeting that takes place around sunset, colleagues and/or students will need to break their fast and pray at sunset. Making an announcement at the beginning of your gathering that folks are welcome to leave as needed can help create a welcoming environment.
- Check in with your colleagues and students: Ramadan and other seasons of fasting can be both physically and mentally challenging, so it's a kind gesture to ask how they're doing during this time.
- Be considerate, but not over-cautious: You don't need to refrain from eating around someone who is fasting, but it's always respectful to ask them what they prefer.
- Respect privacy: If someone is not fasting, avoid asking personal or invasive questions. There are a variety of
 reasons why someone may not be fasting, and it is up to each individual whether they wish to share that
 information.



STAY ALERT: PHISHING SCAMS ON THE RISE AMID FEDERAL CHANGES BY IT SECURITY

With recent changes in the U.S. federal government, cybercriminals are taking advantage of the shifting landscape to launch new phishing attacks. These scams often impersonate government agencies, officials, or policies to trick individuals into revealing sensitive information or clicking malicious links.

Phishing emails may appear urgent, referencing new regulations, tax updates, or security verifications. Attackers craft messages that mimic legitimate sources, making them difficult to spot. Be especially cautious of emails that:

- Claim to be from federal agencies requesting personal information.
- Contain urgent language pressuring immediate action.
- Include links or attachments that may install malware.

To protect yourself, verify the sender's email address, hover over links before clicking, and never provide sensitive information via email. If in doubt, contact the agency directly through official channels. Staying vigilant against phishing scams ensures your personal and professional information remains secure. When in doubt, report suspicious emails to your IT department or the appropriate authorities.

Here is an example of a phishing message received by one of our colleagues recently.

Your StudentLoans have been flagged as possibly eligible for forgiveness under the new 2025 guidelines. Your file will remain open in my system for only one more day. Please give me a call at: (888)-996-7652, We can take your call between the hours of 8am-5pm(PST) Monday-Friday. Thank you, - Jestine Chartraw"

Note several hallmarks of phishing in the example. The sender email is not an official US government email (.gov) and urgency: "your file will remain open in my system for only one more day"

Make sure you evaluate your emails with a wary eye to stay safe!
