

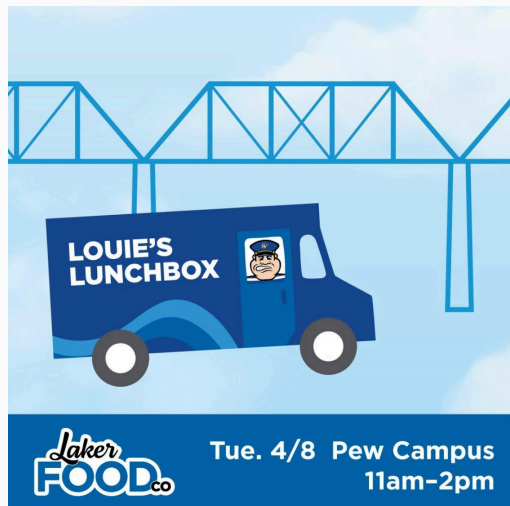

STEELCASE LIBRARY CLOSED SUMMER 2025: TRANSFORMING SERVICES

Steelcase Library, in DeVos Center Building A, will be transforming its service offerings to start in Fall 2025. This transformation will require the temporary closure of the Steelcase Library and Curriculum Materials Library space to public users from May 2025 - August 2025. Replenish will no longer be available at this library location after April 23, 2025.

Fall 2025

Starting in Fall 2025 the Steelcase Library Space will include:

- A Universal Testing Center
- A Psychology laboratory
- Expanded partnership and presence of the Knowledge Market and Tutoring Services
- Individual or group study pods

The library will continue to provide these services:

Summer

[Liaison librarians](#) who work in Steelcase Library will be available for online contact and campus meetings. Permanent office locations are still being determined, but they will be in the DeVos Center on the Pew Campus. Liaison librarians will communicate their new location with the departments they serve when the locations are finalized.

We will still be able to access materials from the Steelcase Library but the turnaround may be slower. To ensure access to needed materials we recommend [requesting any print or CML materials](#) you may need for summer research during April. We are working with facilities to provide a Pew Campus pickup location. Pickups can also be done at Frey Foundation Learning Commons on the Health Campus, or at the Mary Idema Pew Library in Allendale.

IS THAT LINK SAFE? HOW TO SPOT A SUSPICIOUS WEB LINK IN YOUR EMAIL BY INFORMATION SECURITY

We've all been there—an email pops up in your inbox with a link that seems important. Maybe it's from your bank, your favorite store, or even a colleague. But how do you know if clicking that link is safe?

Phishing emails are one of the most common ways cybercriminals try to steal personal information or install malware on your computer. The good news? You can protect yourself by learning how to recognize suspicious links before you click.

Here's What to Look For:

1. Hover Before You Click

Before clicking on any link, hover your mouse over it (don't click!). This will show you the real web address. If the address looks odd, misspelled, or doesn't match the company's official website, it's a red flag.

2. Check for HTTPS

Secure websites start with `https://`, not just `http://`. The "s" stands for secure. While `https` doesn't guarantee a site is safe, a lack of it is definitely suspicious—especially if you're being asked to enter personal information.

3. Be Wary of Shortened Links

Some attackers use URL shorteners (like `bit.ly`) to hide where a link will really take you. If you receive a shortened link from someone you don't know—or even from someone you do—proceed with caution. You can use link-expanding services to see the full address before visiting.

4. Unexpected Attachments or Links

Did you get an email with a link or attachment you weren't expecting? Even if it looks like it's from someone you know, it could be a spoofed email. When in doubt, contact the sender directly using a method you trust (not by replying to the email).

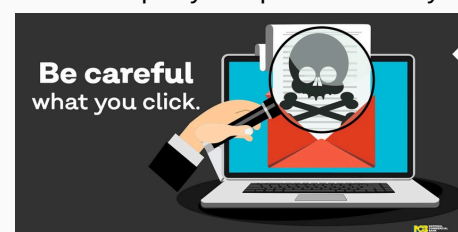
5. Generic Greetings and Urgent Language

Phishing emails often use greetings like "Dear Customer" and create a sense of urgency ("Your account will be suspended!"). If the email tries to scare you into clicking a link, it's best to pause and verify.

When in Doubt, Don't Click

It's better to be safe than sorry. If you're ever unsure about a link or an email, reach out to your IT support or use official channels to verify. For personal emails, if you are unsure, rather than clicking on a link in the email, go to a known good web link, or use a search engine to find the company in question. Staying alert and cautious can save you from falling victim to a cyber scam.

Stay safe out there—and happy clicking (on the right links)!

CAMPUS SAFETY TIPS: SEVERE WEATHER SEASON

Non-emergency situations

During a thunderstorm watch or warning, and even a tornado watch, University operations will continue as normal. These are considered non-emergency situations.

In the event of a watch, keep an eye on sudden changes in weather. Department emergency coordinators will be alerted if one of our campuses falls under the National Weather Service designated watch area. Outdoor activities may be canceled.

Emergency Situations

If the NWS issues a tornado warning, it means a tornado has been sighted or radar indicates a possible funnel cloud is approaching one of our campuses. When a tornado warning is issued in Kent or Ottawa counties, this is an EMERGENCY requiring people in the area under the warning to shelter immediately. University operations will be suspended across ALL CAMPUSES if a tornado warning is issued in either Kent County or Ottawa County. This means all events, classes and dining, Rec Center, and meeting activities will be suspended until the event passes.

When a tornado warning is issued, outdoor sirens will be activated and a GVSUAlert! will be sent to the entire campus community via text message, email and campus computer networks. A link to a webpage with instructions about what to do and where to seek shelter on campus will be provided.

Designated tornado safety locations

During severe weather, members of our community can find the severe weather safety locations on the Classroom Emergency Placards or by visiting [our website where shelter locations are detailed](#).

If a designated shelter location does not provide enough space, individuals should proceed to the lowest level of a building and/or an interior room without windows.

Outdoor warning system

Tornado sirens will sound in the areas of the warning. It is possible sirens may sound in the entire county even if the NWS issues for only a portion of the county. It is very rare, but outdoor warning sirens can also be activated for significant straight-line winds and other emergencies like a significant hazardous material spill. The GVSUAlert! system will provide instruction in one of those unlikely events.

In the event a tornado warning is issued

1. A GVSUAlert! will be issued to all students, faculty and staff.
2. All GVSU operations will be suspended until the event has passed.
3. Offices, departments, campus dining and Fieldhouse personnel will suspend normal operations.
4. People on campus should go to the nearest [tornado safety location](#).
5. If someone is unable to make it to a designated tornado safety location, they should move to a small, interior room on the lowest level of the building they are in and stay away from windows, doors and outside walls.
6. Remain calm, walk --do not run-- and avoid elevators.
7. Stay in the shelter until an "All Clear" message is given via the GVSUAlert! system.
