HEALTH INSURANCE FOR RETIREES UPDATE

Bargaining unit members who were hired prior to January 1, 2014 received an email from HR on February 6, followed by a letter from Plante & Moran in mid-February (which was signed by Vice President Shorty). Both the email and the letter have been a source of confusion for some of our members. I would like to use this space this month to explain what has happened and what will happen next, for impacted bargaining unit members as it pertains to sections 9.4.C and 12.4.2 of our contractual agreement.

APSS leadership and HR met on January 13 to discuss some impending changes related to health insurance for retirees. Health insurance for official retirees is a “me too” benefit that had been codified for all employees hired prior to January 1, 2014. Our current section 12.4.2 states that “[t]he University retains the right to modify or terminate this plan upon reasonable notice to staff and retirees and provided that the changes are for each staff member group.” When we met with our colleagues from HR, we agreed that over six months/over a year of notification constitutes “reasonable notice,” and we signed a letter of agreement that states:

~~9.4.C Job Share Classification. Medical Insurance for Retirees will be made available to the same extent and in the same manner as is available to other part-time University staff members. (This language has been stricken.)~~

12.4.2 Medical Insurance for Retirees. Effective January 1, 2027, the University shall not offer a medical insurance plan to retirees. Any prior provisions related to retiree medical insurance are concluded and have no further force or effect. (This language replaces the current 12.4.2)

What had been provided to Grand Valley’s official retirees was access to the GV PPO Plan administered by Priority Health. The retiree would pay the amount of the monthly premium for the benefit; the employer would pay the retiree the difference between the cost of this plan and the cost of COBRA. Additionally, the employer was also paying out medigap reimbursements to official retirees. Effective January 1, 2027, the employer will no longer provide access to a health insurance plan/medigap reimbursement for official retirees of the University. This includes those who have already retired, those who are planning on retiring, and those who were hired prior to January 1, 2014 who have not yet retired.

All eligible employees (not just bargaining unit members), will next receive individualized information from Plante & Moran, which should provide the information necessary to make an informed decision on whether the impacted employee would like to opt for a taxable one-time lump sum payment equal to the actuarial value of the future benefit or a guaranteed annuity equal to the same value that will issue payments to eligible retirees twice a year, upon retirement. Elections will need to be designated within 30 days of receiving the personalized information from Plante & Moran.

I hope that this helps provide a bit of clarity on what is happening and what will happen for GV employees who were hired prior to January 1, 2014. Please do not hesitate to connect with me if you have any questions or concerns.




She and Her Cat by Naruki Nagakawa (translated by Ginny Tapley Takemori). Recommended by **Natalie Day, KCON and her cat,**




The Lord of the Rings: The Fellowship of the Ring by J.R.R. Tolkien.
